

Argentinian Citrus Essential Oils 1992-1996^a

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Over the last two decades several reports have been published on the production of essential oils in Argentina, particularly the citrus oils.¹⁻⁴ Among the citrus oils, lemon is the dominant product. It is produced in large amounts in Tucumán province and it alone has sustained the Argentinean citrus processing industry.

Over the years, production of lemon oil has increased to the point where Argentina is now the largest producing country.^{5,6} Annual exportation and importation statistics on citrus oil were obtained from the Instituto Nacional de Estadística y Censos⁷ and the production statistics were obtained from the Federación Argentina del Citrus.⁹ Additional information was obtained from the Anales de la Sociedad Argentina para la Investigación de Productos Aromáticos and private estimates of quinquennial averages and percentages of each oil. Using all of these data, the export volumes and value for lemon oil over the past 20 years have been determined. Further information was also obtained from the major importing countries for the last five years for the other citrus oils. The resulting information has been collated and tabulated for lemon oil, orange oil, grapefruit oil, mandarin oil and bergamot oil for the years 1992-1996.

Table 1 shows the production statistics for the years 1992-1996. The mean value of production of each of the

citrus oils is shown in Table 2. To put this in perspective, the variation of citrus oil production over the period 1975 to 1995 can be seen in Table 3. Because all of the citrus oils produced in Argentina are not exported, a summary of the exportation statistics for Argentinean citrus oils is shown in Table 4 with the value of these oils summarized in Table 5.

The specific countries that have imported lemon oil from Argentina over the 1992-1996 period can be seen in Table 6 and the dollar value of these imports can be seen in Table 7. Again, to put this in perspective, the exportation statistics for Argentinean lemon oil between 1977 and 1996 are shown in Table 8.

Although Argentina produces and exports citrus oils, it also imports some oils. A summary of the amounts and dollar value of Argentinean imports of citrus oils can be seen in Tables 9 and 10, respectively. Finally, the trade balance between imports and exports of citrus oils (in millions of US\$) can be seen in Table 11.

Examination of the data presented in Tables 1-7 reveals that the average production of citrus oils in Argentina over the quinquennium 1992-1996 was around 2,330 tons per year at an approximate value of US\$35 million, with lemon oil value accounting for approximately 91%. Between 1975 and 1995 lemon oil production increased approximately 500% (1,700 tons). Over the period 1992-1996 Argentinean citrus oil exports increased approximately US\$10 million (40% increase) owing mainly to increased US purchases. A

comparison between the lemon oil exports over the period 1977-1996 (Table 8) reveals that there has been a steady increase in oil production. It should be noted that the exceptional high price of lemon oil in 1980 (US\$34.80 per kg)—a nearly two-fold increase in value over other years—was caused by a world shortage of the oil.

The importation statistics shown in Tables 9 and 10 reveal that, on a value basis, the major citrus oil imported into Argentina was lime oil, with a quinquennial average value of US\$440,000 per year. Nevertheless, the value of

exports compared to the value of imports reveals a favorable balance for Argentina with an average of almost US\$28 million for the quinquennium 1992-1996. 1995 was the best year, with a favorable balance of US\$35 million.

We believe that on the basis of this analysis of Argentinean citrus oil production and value, the future looks very promising, especially for the possibilities of producing and exporting more lemon oil to both the United States and the United Kingdom.
